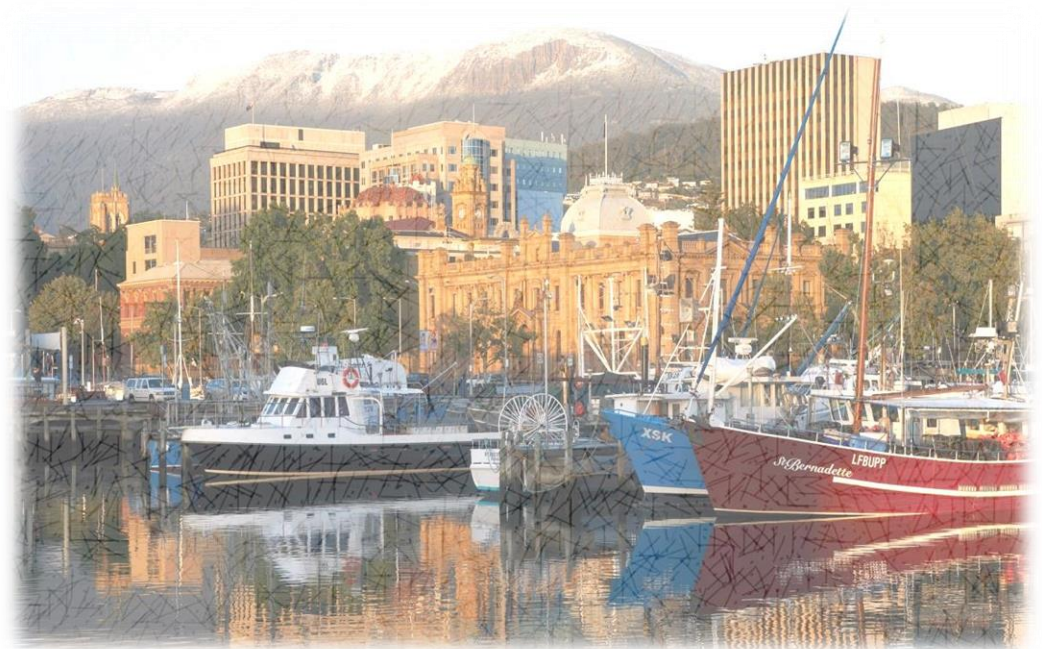

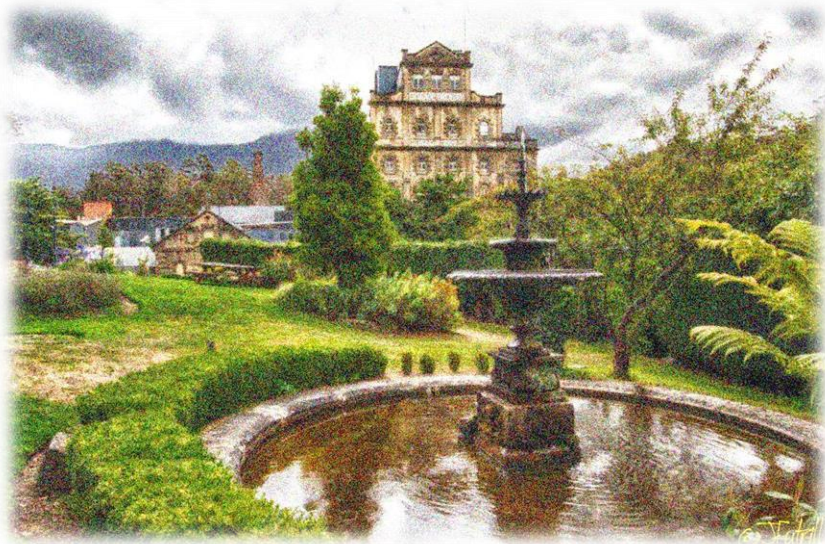


Hobart (Capital City of Tasmania)

A taste of Tasmania itself. An Introductory Day Tour

Hobart is like no other capital city in Australia. It is a compact city set against the towering backdrop of Mount Wellington. It hugs the scenic Derwent Waterfront and is a wonderful mixture of convict, colonial and seafaring past.

Hobart was established in 1804, making it Australia's second oldest capital, and has managed to escape the clutches of the developers with its early architectural heritage remarkably well preserved.



From **Launceston** we travel down what is known as the Heritage Highway passing through the town of **Campbell Town** with its lovely Red Bridge. We continue to **Ross** with its handsome sandstone buildings situated along its tree lined main street still looking much as they did in the nineteenth century. The Ross Bridge has 180 carvings of faces, animals and Celtic symbols that decorate the edge of its three arches. Morning tea overlooking the Ross Bridge (provided).

Arriving into **Hobart**, via its northern suburbs, we will commence a tour of Tasmania's Capital which will include;

Touring around the centre of Hobart with its many sandstone public buildings including the **State's Parliament House**.

Salamanca Place, on Hobart's waterfront, is lined with a long row of simple Georgian sandstone warehouses adjacent to the harbour and was built in the 1830's. These mellow north-facing buildings once stored grain, wool, apples and imported goods from around the world.

Today, you can wander under the heavy stone arches to find many different speciality shops. On Saturday Salamanca is abuzz with its famous street market.

Battery Point is considered to be Australia's most complete colonial village and has changed little since the 1830's & 1840's when it was settled by fishermen and seafarers. With its dramatic glimpses of sea and mountains, narrow, hilly streets, corner shops and quaint cottages, the modern-day visitor will find much to enjoy here. **Narryna**, a Georgina residence now a museum in Battery Point is furnished as it was when first built, we will make a visit.



Mount Wellington rises 1270 meters above Hobart's harbour and is a back drop to the city itself, providing a wilderness experience within a 20 minute drive of the city and is much loved by locals. Any image of Hobart always has Mount Wellington looming in the background.

The 21 km drive to the summit takes you from temperate rainforest to sub alpine flora and glacial rock formations, ending in panoramic views of Hobart and its surrounds. The present road was blasted from rock during the Great Depression in 1932, around the same time the Sydney Harbour Bridge was built. No other city in Australia has a vista like this one.

Touring down the southern shore line passing **Sandy Bay and Taroona**. Pass **Government house** before crossing the **Tasman Bridge** for views back onto the city from **Rosny and Bellerive**, passing through its charming main street.

Departing Hobart we re-join the Heritage Highway making a stop at **Oatlands** on the way home. Oatlands is considered to have the largest number of colonial sandstone buildings of any town in Australia, many of them built by convict labour. We will have a short break here before continuing back to Launceston.
